

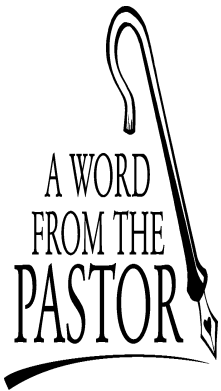

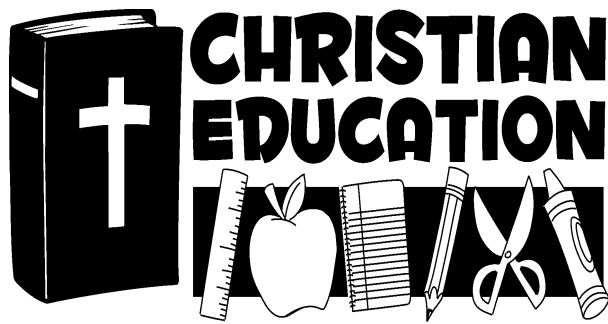
FALL WORKDAY A BIG SUCCESS

Eric's seizures kick in (any of you who has witnessed Eric's post seizure state, knows that the kid can *scream*), and my three year old starts a screaming tirade because she can't get her sock off, accompanied by the insipid, bored complaints of my seven year old because he doesn't want to do the math lesson I have assigned for the day. The windows are open in the car, so everyone in the parking lot of the grocery store can hear the thunderous cacophony of screams erupting from the belly of my van and lookers-on and can only imagine what I am doing to my children (when all the while I am really praying for patience and for the ever increasing flush of red on my face to disappear into a heavenly countenance of peace)! Then Olivia pukes on my shirt and her diaper leaks on my pants as I try to reason with my three year old that it is not necessary to take her sock off in the car, and can she please leave it on because we need to go in the store if Eric ever stops screaming. Then I climb, drenched and smelly, to the back of the car to manage Eric's seizures, pausing briefly to comment to my seven year old, not with words, but with the perfected 'evil eye' that says 'one more word and you will spend the rest of the afternoon scrubbing the bathroom floor!' (Isn't it amazing how moms have the ability to speak volumes with their eyes? It must be all the voluminous mascara we wear!) ☺ Soon I am stretched to the brink of despair and tears of frustration begin to well up in my eyes, but then I stop and think how positively rich I am! Not rich in finances, but rich in love! My children are my greatest riches, and I need to take every silly, frustrated moment to heart, knowing that these are the moments of our lives. Let's all celebrate with a frothy cup of International Coffee, shall we?!

Seriously, now...I have learned long ago to commit passages of Scripture to my heart and mind so that in situations like these, I may call upon them in a jiffy and be reminded of my blessings. At this particular moment, I called to mind two favorite passages: *"Those who wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength...and mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary, they shall*

walk and not faint” (Is.40:31). You see, in order to be thankful for something, you need to be thankful for *all* of it. I am so thankful for my children (and even more thankful for their cherub-like faces that can bat fluttery eyelashes, rosy red grins and blow smooshy kisses that prevent me from putting them out with the trash in the morning!) and if I am thankful for them, then I must be thankful for everything about them and that includes the screaming-tyrannical-pukey-parade that occurred on this lovely Fall afternoon.

As we approach this Thanksgiving season, let us approach it with a true spirit of thanks, recalling to mind that blessed verse from Thessalonians that

Jesus said, *“Do not store up treasures for yourselves on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also”* (Matthew 6:19-21). If you had to say what you treasure the most, how would you respond? Does your treasure lie in God or in things you own? Memorial Funds are established to provide a venue for financial donations to be made for designated purposes for the further support of church related activities. Donations are often made in memory of an individual or to honor a special life event like a birthday, the birth of a child, a marriage or an anniversary. Donations to these funds need not be limited to commemorating such events, and may be made at any time and for any reason. Donations may be directed toward a specific purchase (e.g. "candles for the altar") or activity (e.g. "field trips for Good Shepherd Children's Center students").

The Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd (LCGS) has five Memorial Funds, each designated for a specific purpose. If you are thinking about making a donation, please review the descriptions and consider which most touches your heart.

Building Fund: This fund supports the preservation of the church buildings and grounds through planned renovations. These activities preserve the integrity of our church home and help ensure adequate facility size and design to meet our Congregational needs.

Church Improvement Fund: This fund supports the continual improvements to the church's interior and exterior that are not part of planned renovation. These include things such as flowers and trees on the grounds, vestments for acolytes and deacons, draperies or other interior design features and altar linens, paraments and candles to enhance our worship environment.


School Endowment Fund: The Endowment Fund is used to support the Good Shepherd Christian Education activities. These funds are used for the purchase of library books, art supplies, musical instruments, wall art and playground equipment to enrich student experiences.

Family Relief Fund: The Family Relief Fund provides financial support to families in need. Donations are used to defray the costs of food, housing and other routine expenses to families in financial crisis.

Church Scholarship Fund: This fund provides college-bound applicants with support to help defray the costs of tuition, textbooks, calculators, computers, and other scholastic supplies.

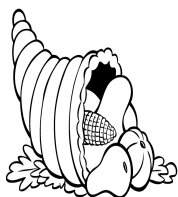

As in the past, our limit is \$25 for each person for the regular Angels. This is to ensure that each member of a family gets a gift of equal value.

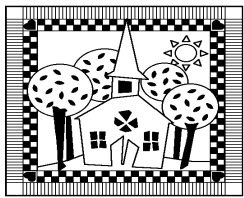
